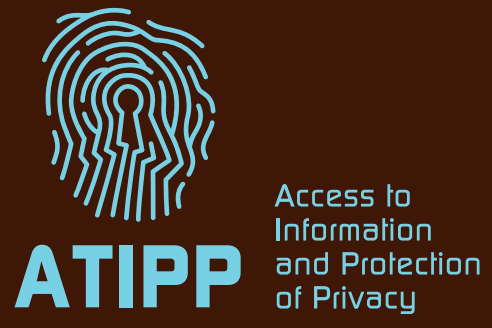

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Activity Report on the Administration of the **ATIPP Act**

April 1, 2012 to March 31, 2013



I am pleased to once again present the annual report outlining activities in the 2012-13 fiscal year related to the administration of the *Access to Information and Protection of Privacy (ATIPP) Act*.

The ATIPP Act plays a critical role in ensuring Yukoners have access to Yukon government program information as well as their own personal information, at the same time ensuring personal information is protected from unauthorized collection, use or disclosure.

The Yukon government continues to support its commitment and improve its practices to ensure accountability and transparency in its information management practices.

The 2012/13 reporting year is notable in that there was a sharp increase in ATIPP requests; therefore, I have included a summary in order to account for the increased activity.

As always, ATIPP Office staff are available to assist you with any questions and comments about the information provided in this document and to guide you through the ATIPP process.

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Summary 2012/13

Activity Levels (Access to Information)

Incoming access requests doubled from the 2011/12 reporting year, as indicated in Table 1. This was the result of two major pressures: the first being a spike of applicant activity leading to the September 19, 2012, deadlines related to the Indian Residential School Claim Resolution Process, and the second being a large number of requests related to amendments to the *ATIPP Act* passed by the Yukon Legislative Assembly in December 2012.

Legislative Amendment

Amendments to three sections of the *ATIPP Act* came into effect, as follows:

Section 5: To limit the right of access to briefing materials specific to preparing

- a Minister in relation to a sitting of the Legislative Assembly, including briefings to support debate on an appropriation bill
- a Minister in respect of assuming responsibilities for a new department or corporation
- the Premier in respect of forming a new government

This limitation to the right of access extends only until 5 years after the date of the activity referenced above.

Section 15: To enable a public body to refuse to disclose records where disclosure would reveal a confidence of the Executive Council or its committees and to provide a limited/explicit list of Cabinet-related records that must be excepted from release.

Section 16: To expand and clarify what types of information within records may be withheld as “policy advice” in order to assist public bodies in using this discretionary exception.

Significant Activities

ATIPP Office staff attended the Alberta Access and Privacy Conference in June 2012. Yukon also continues to actively participate as a member of the Privacy Subcommittee of the federal/provincial/territorial Public Sector Chief Information Officer Council.

Access and privacy training was delivered internally to ATIPP coordinators (individually and as a group) and to various program areas across government, and continues to be part of the quarterly government-wide corporate orientation program.

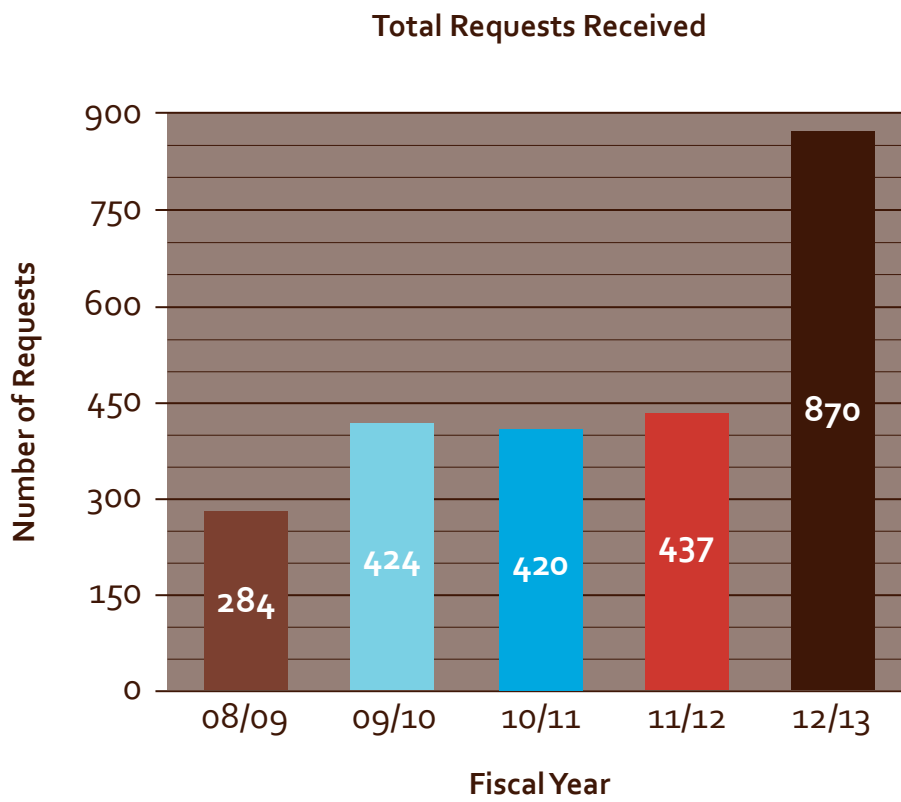

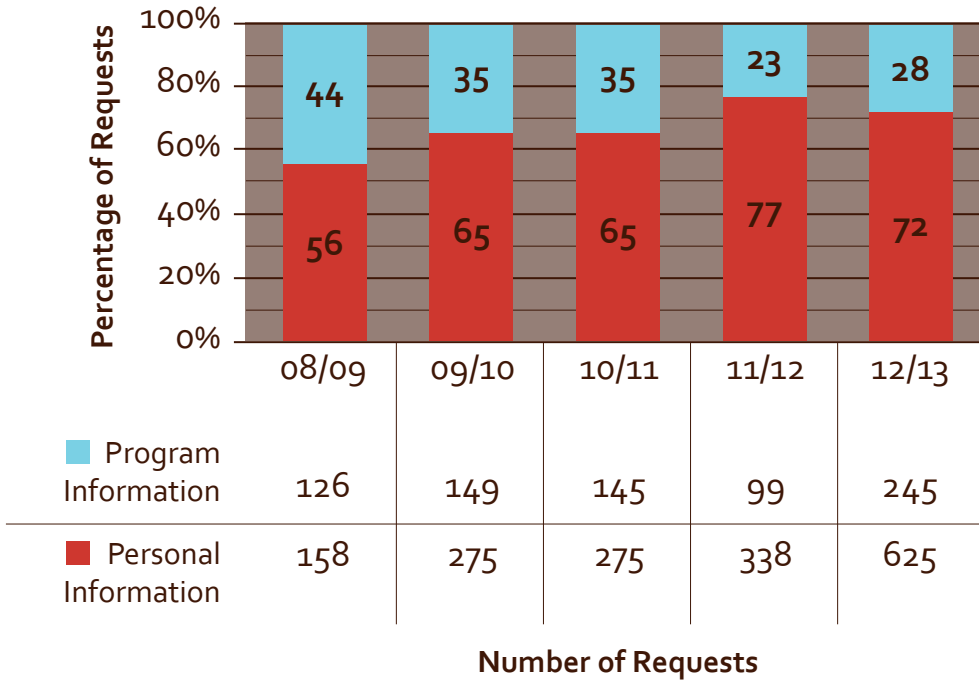

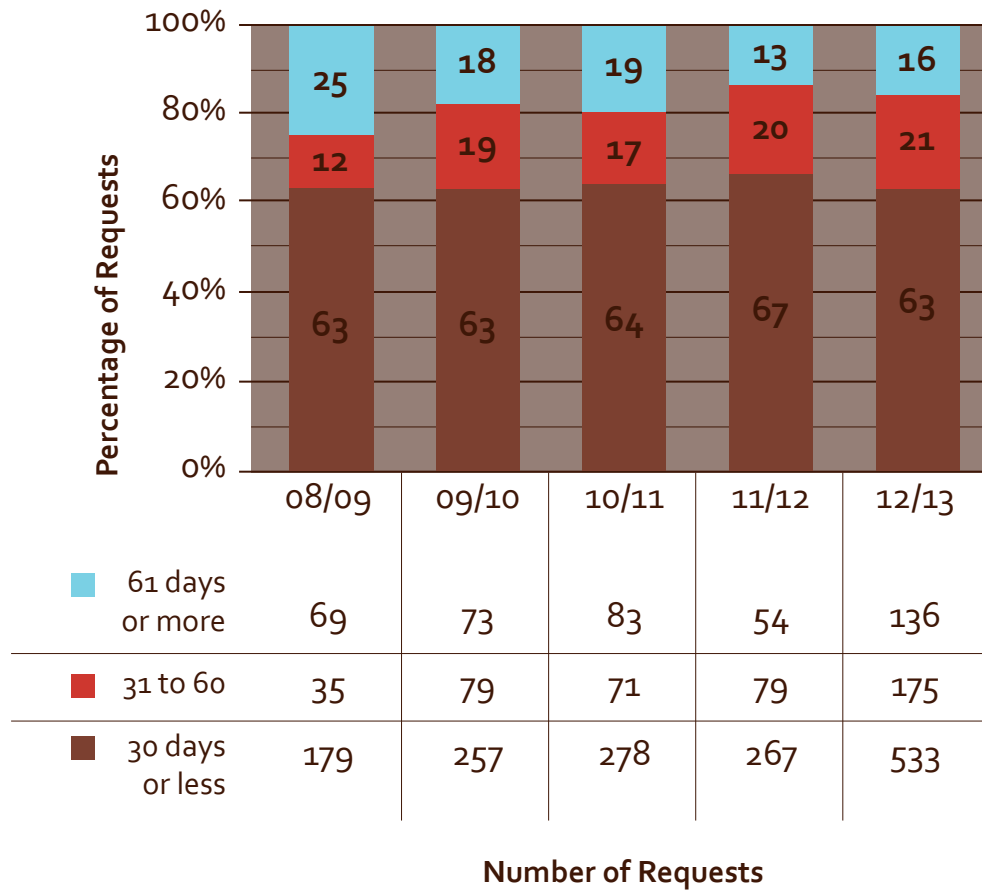

Response Time of Total Formal Requests Completed

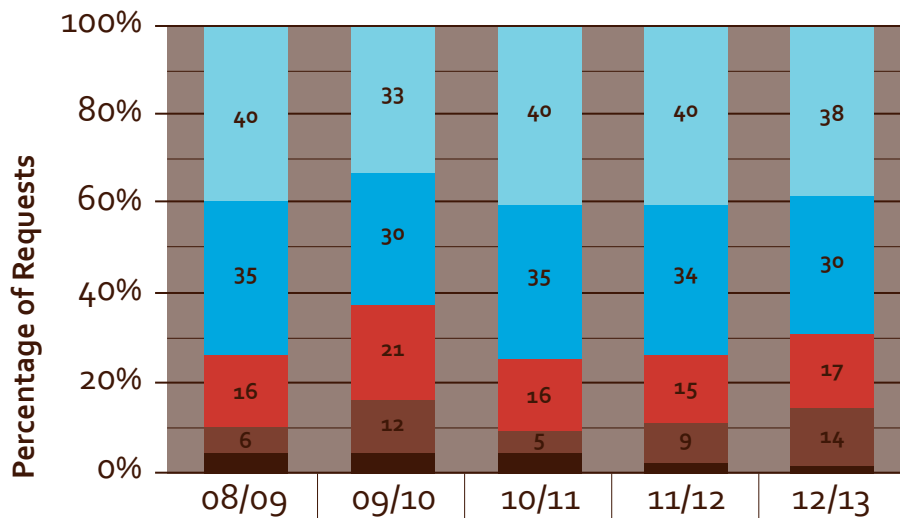
**Response Time
